A SOLIDARITY THAT DOESN'T BREAK THE REV. HANNAH ADAIR BONNER

The Rev. Hannah Bonner is a United Methodist pastor whose call led her to keep vigil for 80 consecutive days at the Waller County Jail, Texas, where Sandra Bland, an African-American woman, was jailed and mysteriously died while in custody. The Rev. Bonner has launched a movement that brings theological tools to current issues around race and culture, speaking through social media and traditional forms of peaceful resistance. Having been featured in *The Washington Post* and other national news sources, she is an active clergy person serving on the front lines of justice.
